



Union Chapel resumes Sunday summer services

NORTH HAMPTON — The Union Chapel, an interdenominational house of worship located by the sea at Little Boar's Head in North Hampton, has opened for its 129th summer season of Sunday worship from now through September 4. All services begin at 11 a.m.

The history of the Union Chapel begins in the second half of the 19th century, when a health-conscious public developed Seacoast sites as the age of leisure, and vacations started to appear. Little Boar's head became an ideal spot to locate summer homes known as "cottages." In 1875, residents gathered on the south side of Chapel Road for Sunday worship.

Mrs. Eliza P. Philbrick realized the need for a house of worship, and deeded land to trustees of the Union Chapel Fund. A neo-Gothic style building — the Union Chapel — was built in 1877 for the sum of \$3000. Ever since, Sunday summer services have been held "for all Christian denominations" selected to continue the interdenominational character of a liturgy

based on a Protestant Reformation tradition.

Throughout the years, congregations have been fortunate to have many different worship leaders — noted preachers, seminary professors and administrators, and denominational officials — conduct Sunday services at the Union Chapel.

The sanctuary itself has outstanding religious art represented in glass. Above the altar facing "east light" is a three-panel window of quiet hills and peaceful streams by Louis Comfort Tiffany, given in 1926 in memory of Mary Bell White, Elizabeth W. Stott, and Phoebe S. Baker.

Below the chapel's bell tower, and on both sides of the main aisle are windows designed by Charles J. Connick, given in 1936 and 1937 in memory of Flora Tufts Fuller by her daughter, Martha Fuller Halsey, and her son, Governor Alvin Tufts Fuller, a trustee from 1937-58.

In the south alcove is a Connick window symbolizing the 23rd Psalm, given in memory of Miss Clara M. Flower by her family.

Thus this pristine spot of quietude by the ever-changing ocean continues a tradition envisioned by its founders and supporters over the years — all to the greater glory of God.

In August, guest ministers will include Rev. Peter Hunt Meek, D.Min., Minister of Hancock United Church of Christ in Lexington, Massachusetts, August 7; Rev. Robert H. Thompson, BD, School Minister of Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, August 21; Rev. Earl Holt III, DD, Minister, King's Chapel in Boston, August 28 (the visiting preacher for the August 14 service will be announced).

Preaching on Sunday, September 4 will be Rev. Arthur Newell Foye, D.Min., Executive minister Emeritus, American Baptist Churches of New Hampshire and Vermont.

The public is invited to attend Sunday worship services at the Union Chapel, located in North Hampton at Little Boar's Head, where Willow Avenue and Route 1A meet.
